



About the Friends of the Ypsilanti Freighthouse

The Ypsilanti Freighthouse is a city-owned structure managed by the Friends of the Ypsilanti Freighthouse (FOYF). The FOYF is an all-volunteer, 501(c)3 non-profit organization with the mission of managing, preserving and cultivating the heritage of the Ypsilanti Freighthouse. Our goal is to create a sustainable business structure, while promoting inclusive community participation by providing an environmentally sound gathering place for recreation, celebration, arts, education and local activities.

FOYF took over fundraising efforts in 2004, after the repairs needed to keep doors open became too costly for the city to shoulder alone. More than \$900,000 was raised from 2004 to 2017 from sources including federal and state grants, fundraising events, Patronicity community support and city funds.




Completed renovations 2004 - 2016

☑ Repaired structural failings including foundation repairs, wall stabilization, repair of

trusses and hardware, masonry repairs, and soffit and eaves repairs.

- ✓ Installed new standing seam steel roof
- ☑ Repaired deck and ramp
- ✓ Upgraded electrical, plumbing and HVAC systems
- Upgraded security system
- ☑ Replaced floor beam in cafe
- ☑ Installed fire suppression system



- ☑ Built out brand new bathrooms and storage attic
- ☑ Renovated former bathrooms into cleaning and maintenance closets
- ☑ Painted interior of building and deck
- ☑ Installed rain garden to improve building runoff
- ☑Installed exterior lighting all sides of the building



2017 Accomplishments

- After 13 long years, the Freighthouse doors opened last spring and began taking bookings in mid-March.
- ☆ Krista Jacob, our events and non-profit business manager, was hired. With her on board, the Freighthouse has been able to market and book the space for more than 50 events in 2017. In 2018, she'll move to full time.
- The City of Ypsilanti granted the building a permanent certificate of occupancy.
- ☆ With the help of Steve Pierce, the Freighthouse has become a Wireless Ypsi hotspot.
- A brand-new website was launched with up-todate information on the facility, when it's booked and how to rent space.
- ☆ With the help of Dave Strenski, solar panels were installed linking the building into the Solar Ypsi project.
- Policies, regulations and a rental contract were established for all bookings.



- A more robust social media presence through Facebook and Instagram was developed.
- ☆The final bits of renovations needed to open including installing a new generator system and fire access to the building's west side were finished.
- Contracts for snow management, trash management and parking management with local service providers were created.
- And best of all, the 2018 booking revenue covered all of the building's expenses! The Ypsilanti Freighthouse is financially stable.




Freighthouse Usage



In 2017, we housed 57 different events from weddings, graduations and business launch parties to city public input meetings, the Ypsilanti Heritage Festival Gala and Ypsi-Arbor Soup. In total, our booked events brought 4,000 people to Depot Town at an average of 72 people per event.

Breakdown of 2017 events



We held the following public events:

Freighthouse Holiday Festival, Ypsilanti Heritage Festival Gala, First Fridays (October and November), Depot Town Merchants' Tree Lighting, Ypsi-Arbor Soup (May and September), YCS Realtor Mixer, Traveling Gypsies Vintage Pop Up (June and July), International Village Public Input Sessions, The Color Run Packet Pickup, Ypsilanti Heritage Foundation Volunteer Reception, the National Solar Tour, Concentrate Media Community Panel, Ypsi Real Amtrak Ride Along, Jazz at the Freighthouse and Town Halls with Brian Robb and Pete Murdock.

Local economic impact

The unique nature of the Freighthouse means renters who book the space contract with local businesses for catering, staffing, audio-visual equipment and equipment rental, feeding income into the small businesses that make Depot Town such a great attraction.


